Gospel Reflection: A Royal Shepherd

On this last Sunday of the Church's year we always celebrate the Feast of Christ, the Universal King.

The first reading from the prophet, Daniel, speaks of the coming of one who will rule in the name of God in an eternal kingdom. The second reading from the Book of the Apocalypse speaks of Christ as the 'faithful witness' to God and 'ruler of the kings of the earth'. Here is a king who loves his people and sheds his own blood to save them.

The Gospel comes from the Passion of Jesus in St John's Gospel. It is Jesus' dialogue with Pilate about his kingship and the nature of his kingdom.

Jesus is anything but a traditional king. This King reigns, not from a golden throne, but a cross of rough wood; naked, with no rich, flowing robes; no bejewelled crown, just thorns; no orb and sceptre, just nails in his hands. He comes among his people, not as a tyrant wielding weapons of suffering and death, but as a powerless baby.

Jesus says that his kingdom is 'not of this world'. It is not a kingdom with geographical and national boundaries. It is not a kingdom in the earthly sense where power and oppression reign, but a kingdom where justice, love, mercy, truth and peace reign.

At the end of the day, the disciple is called to be the Kingdom (the living presence) of God in the world and to transform the suffering of its people into joy by deeds of loving kindness.

Virtuous disciples are the living presence of Jesus in the world. They realise that until Jesus comes again, the kingdom has been entrusted into their hands. In the Kingdom of Jesus, the disciple is not master but 'servant'.

The power of the spirit of Jesus fuels deeds of loving kindness - reversing horrible human conditions, and bringing healing and salvation.

Whenever we act like Christ the Kingdom of God (the reign of God's grace) breaks into our world.

Whenever we are moved by the Spirit to proclaim the truth, to respond to need, to work for justice, to transform and heal our society, the Kingdom of God breaks into human reality and the grace of God becomes clearly visible in our words and actions.

SIXTEEN DAYS OF ACTIVISM

ACRATH (Australian Catholic Religious Against Trafficking in Humans) is calling the community to join a 16-day campaign to end violence against women and girls. The 16 days of activism will run from 25 November, the International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women, to 10 December, Human Rights Day. Each day, ACRATH's campaign calendar provides opportunities to learn, engage and take action against gender-based violence. For almost 20 years ACRATH has been raising awareness and inspiring action against modern slavery through its annual 16-day campaign calendar, which serves as a resource to educate and involve people in the campaign.

According to the Global Report on Trafficking in Persons 2022,

out of every 10 human trafficking victims detected globally, four are adult women and two are girls, with 91 per cent of those trafficked for sexual exploitation being female. During these 16 days, ACRATH invites everyone to explore its calendar of events, resources and stories. Whether it's listening to a podcast, learning about the latest data, watching the Educating for Change university project promotion video or attending the 'Holding the Light' ecumenical service in Melbourne to honour victims and survivors of domestic violence, there is something for everyone to engage with. Lys Crowe, Acting ACRATH National Executive Officer stated that, 'The victim/survivors of gender-based violence are at the heart of the work we do at ACRATH. Over the 16 days, starting on 25 November, we would like to shine a light on the steps you can take to learn more about gender-based violence and the advocacy work we do. We strive for a future where we

What's in a Name?

Realising the historical conation that First Nations People have with the word 'Mission', and given that at least, 10 per cent of the people they serve are First Nations People, Sacred Heart Mission has decided to always refer to itself as 'Sacred Heart Mission' and not 'the Mission'. In Australia's history, missions, reserves and stations were reserves of land to which Aboriginal people were forcibly relocated. These missions were run by officials who had total control over the lives of First Nations People, including the legal guardianship of their children. For them, it is a trauma-filled term that connotes suffering and hardship. Given this, we are all asked to use the full title of Sacred Heart Mission when referring to this organisation, that always seeks to address injustice through the many facets of its work.

Now in its ninth year, the service is invitational and held in a spirit of welcome. While it is held within the Christian tradition, it is open to anyone who might wish to join together and take part in a ritual and is a time for anyone to engage in a period of quiet, lament, and prayer/reflection on the tragic results of violence and in hope for a better future for our communities.

We remember:

- Those killed as a result of domestic violence by naming those who are victims in the service, and by tolling a bell.
- We stand in solidarity with victim survivors by recognising their pain, and listening to their voices.
- We take time to reflect and commit ourselves to addressing the drivers of violence in our own attitudes, communities and contexts.
- We take hope in the Christian message that all may be healed and redeemed, while acknowledging the ongoing trauma, suffering and danger experienced by so many in our communities due to the ongoing use of violence and abuse.
