#### **Gospel Reflection: Two Kinds of Seeing**

Jesus asks him, "What do you want me to do for you?" Bartimaeus says, "My teacher, let me see again." Did you catch what he said? Bartimaeus wants to see "again" meaning that at one point in his life he had vision. There was a time when he could see. So, what if we were to see Bartimaeus' life in three stages? First, Bartimaeus can see. Second, he is blind, sitting on the roadside, and begging. Third, he regains his sight. He did not, however, regain the sight he originally had. It was a different way of seeing.

Sometimes words challenge us to see more than we think is there. The same word can have more than one meaning, and so it is with today's Gospel. We're told that Bartimaeus wanted "to see again" and that "he regained his sight." So we could say that he got back what he once had. That's one way of seeing this text. But those same words can also mean that Bartimaeus wanted "to look up" and that "he looked upwards." And that's another way of seeing this text.

Regaining sight and looking upwards. What if both kinds of seeings are necessary? What if Bartimaeus sees again but in a new way? He now looks upward. He has a higher vision and a greater consciousness.

Isn't that the pattern of spiritual growth we see in the scriptures? Richard Rohr describes it as order, disorder, and reorder. My guess is that every one of us has lived that pattern. Isn't that what happened to Bartimaeus? Isn't that what happened to the Israelites? They went from Egypt to the wilderness, to the promised land. Each of those patterns is a story of life, death, and resurrection.

The thing about sitting in our darkness and begging is that at the time we can never see what is coming to us. I don't think blind Bartimaeus could see what or who was coming his way that day he sat on the roadside begging. The most he could do was to be faithful to his darkness, to not run away, to cry out in hope. And maybe that's true for you and me.

We sit in our darkness begging and then one day something begins to come into focus. Things start to look different. We catch a glimpse of a new life. We have an insight about ourselves. We begin to see things in a new light. I don't know how that happens. I only know that it does happen, even if takes years.

That's what sitting in darkness and begging has done for me. It continues to open my eyes. It continues to show me new paths for my life. It continues to help me see things in a new light.

What about you? What have you learned about yourself from sitting in the darkness and begging? What are you seeing anew or maybe for the first time? In what ways is your seeing changing?

What if changing our lives and our world begins with changing how we see?

#### OPPORTUNITY TO PART OF OUR LEADERSHIP GROUP

# PROGRESS REPORT ON THE CARITAS AUSTRALIA APPEAL FOR LEBANON

Caritas Australia's partners in Lebanon have given an update on the charity's assistance in the beleaguered country, with more than 130,000 hot meals delivered in four days to people in need

Between 18-21 October, a Caritas Lebanon program run in partnership with the World Food Program saw 134,571 hot meals distributed. On 18 October, 1000 dignity kits were also given to those in need, along with 1327 mattresses, 1328 pillows, 1328 blankets, 776 hygiene kits and 756 baby kits. This is just a snapshot of the work being done by Caritas partners, who have supported over 100,000 internally displaced and affected persons since 24 September, delivering over one million critical services, including daily hot meals, ready-to-eat food packages, hygiene kits, baby and elderly care kits, protection services, and comprehensive healthcare including psychosocial support to help individuals cope with trauma. "Behind the politics of this dire and rapidly escalating conflict in the Middle East are real people, families and communities fleeing their homes with nothing," said Sally Thomas, humanitarian emergencies lead at Caritas Australia. "Caritas Lebanon's vast network is a lifeline for our brothers and sisters facing severe challenges, as is the continued compassion and generosity of the community here in Australia." # POPE FRANCIS RELEASES NEW ENCYCLICAL ON SACRED HEART OF JESUS

As celebrations are underway for the 350th anniversary of the first manifestation of the Sacred Heart of Jesus to Saint Margaret Mary Alacoque in 1673, Pope Francis released his latest Encyclical - Dilexit nos: On the Human and Divine Love Of the Heart of Jesus Christ. This Encyclical retraces the tradition and relevance of thought on "the human and divine love of the heart of Jesus Christ," calling for a renewal of authentic devotion to avoid forgetting the tenderness of faith, the joy of serving, and the fervour of mission. In our societies, the Pope writes, "we are also seeing a proliferation of varied forms of religiosity that have nothing to do with a personal relationship with the God of love" (87), while Christianity often forgets "the tender consolations of faith, the joy of serving others, the fervour of personal commitment to mission" (88). He states that in the Heart of Christ "we find the whole Gospel" (89). It is in His Heart that "we truly come at last to know ourselves and we learn to love" (30). By encountering the love of Christ, "we become capable of forging bonds of fraternity, of recognizing the dignity of each human being, and of working together to care for our common home," noting the relationship between Dilexit nos and his social Encyclicals Laudato si' and Fratelli tutti (217). And "in the presence of the Heart of Christ," he asks the Lord "to have mercy on this suffering world" and pour upon it "the treasures of His light and love, so that our world, which presses forward despite wars, socio-economic disparities, and uses of technology, that threaten our humanity, may regain the most important and necessary thing of all: the heart" (31).
